

Overview of Higher Education in Boston




15% of Boston residents are enrolled in college




Boston's colleges and universities enrolled 159,720 students in Fall 2022

The 2022-2023 school year saw an increase over prepandemic numbers of university students living in Boston







Demographics of Boston's College Students




57% of undergraduate students in Boston are female



Boston has a younger age structure of its college students - 80% of undergraduates are under 23




Boston attracts more Asian students - almost 25% of graduate students living in Boston are Asian




Where do Boston's Students Come From?




73% of arriving undergraduate students come from the United States, but 45% of graduate students come internationally




The rest of Massachusetts, New York, and California send large shares of our domestic students



Among Boston's arriving international students, over 30% of graduate students and 25% of undergraduates come from China




Northeastern and BU are two of the top three schools in the country for international students in 2022



Where do Boston's Students Go?






Student Housing and Households




Undergraduates tend to live near their schools, but graduate students are more dispersed throughout the city.




Boston students are more likely to live in dorms - 56% of Boston resident undergrads live in dorms






Graduate students are more likely to live with friends or roommates than undergraduates

Universities have major real estate holdings in Boston and make payments in lieu of property taxes


Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILOT)

In FY 2022, tax-exempt educational institutions paid the City of Boston ~\$15 million in cash contributions and ~\$31 million in community benefit credits.

This was 68% of the City's request that PILOT contributions should be 25% of what the institution might expect to pay in real estate taxes if the exempt property were taxable


Development at Educational Institutions

- governed by Institutional Master Plans (IMP) a subset of Article 80 Development Review by the BPDA
- 16 educational institutions have 19 IMPs

10.7m SF of development has been approved since 2013 (renovations and new construction by educational and medical institutions)




Boston's universities bring in research funding - some of which leads to medical breakthroughs




College students participate in Boston's workforce. Almost half of graduate students are working fulltime.



Colleges and universities in Boston employ 42,000 full- and parttime workers with full-time workers earning median personal income of \$74,155




Higher education improves the earning potential of fulltime workers in Boston



Future Concerns for Higher Education



Since 2006, undergraduate enrollment declined by 2.7% in the US while graduate enrollment increased by 35%



Average student loan debt at graduation increased dramatically over the past decades, even adjusting for inflation








Undergraduate international student enrollment in U.S. universities has declined since 2018




Declining births may impact future college enrollment

- Boston has more of a traditional student population than students across the country.
- After pandemic disruptions, Boston's student population has returned to pre-pandemic levels.
- Boston's colleges and universities have a national reputation but play an important role for the region.
- Increasing student loan debt and population decline are associated with the decline in undergraduate enrollment.
- International students may be more difficult to recruit in the future.
